Zionsville's own Scout and Youth Camp has been named CAMP WILSON, in honor of George Wilson, whose generous offer made this Youth Training Center possible.

The original idea of this camp was conceived early in July, 1944 by Scout Master Kenneth Ford and George Wilson. With this as a start, the Scout Troop Committee, Troop No. 358, Boy Scouts of America, with John T. Northam as Chairman, developed the plans, obtained the necessary permits, launched a financial campaign, and brought into existence, CAMP WILSON.

Camp Wilson is for the use of Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H Clubs, and any other duly sponsored, properly chaperoned, Youth Organization, which has been organized for the improvement and training of our boys and girls.

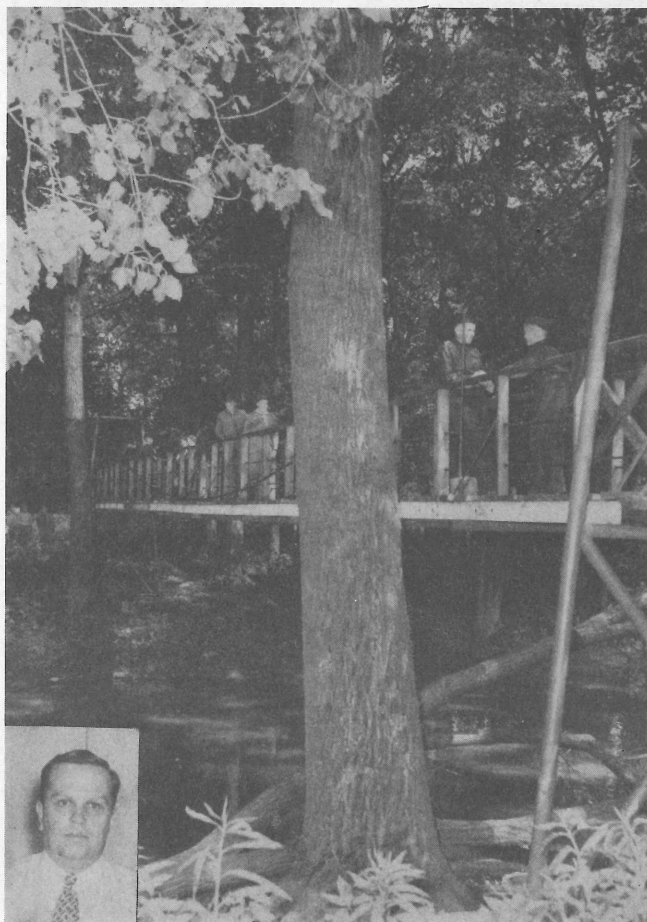
The camp site is located in an eleven acre tract of wooded land, through which passes both Big Eagle and Little Eagle creeks. In addition to the advantages of woods and creeks, this site also contains a large open field which will eventually become Parade Grounds, Football Field, Baseball Diamond, Basketball and Tennis Courts and General Playground. There are many Camping-Areas and Picnic Grounds.

Camp Wilson is located very near the Northeast boundary of Zionsville, within walking distance of the center of town, and of course a roadway for ve-

hicle traffic is provided, with our own parking area serving as the Camp Terminus.

Complete electric service is provided through the facilities of the Public Service Company of Indiana.

EAGLE Bridge, a suspension foot-bridge, ninety feet long, connects the Parking Area with the island formed by the two creeks. This bridge was designed

by Paul W. Moore, and was constructed under his personal supervision. The floor is suspended from 1¼ inch plow steel cables, which after passing over 4 inch steel tubing supports, are securely fastened to very large concrete "dead men" buried four feet

below the surface, extending to a depth of seven feet. Carrying a capacity load, the bridge has a safety factor estimated at 5 to 1.

The Lodge is a combination of masonry and frame construction. This building has a main room thirty-

two feet wide by forty-eight feet long, without posts or obstructions. The floor is concrete and the ceiling is ten feet high, which permits a great many Indoor Activities. An open fireplace is located in the center of the South wall, opposite the main entrance, and a second fireplace is in the center of the West wall. A kitchen twelve feet wide by sixteen feet long, extends



from the East end of the building, and a porch with roof, is across the forty-eight feet long North side, facing the Parade Grounds. This building when used as a dining hall, will accomodate up to 150 at one time.



The Lodge was designed by John T. Northam, who was greatly aided in Construction Supervision by Paul Way, Roy Robey, Howard Way, Cecil Cluck, D. L. Vance and Roy Eck. The fireplaces and flues were designed and built by Paul Way. *

Camp Wilson Trustees

The Scout Troop Committee of Troop No. 358, Boy Scouts of America, realized that operating CAMP WILSON should be on a Business Basis. We also decided it could be more efficiently managed by a smaller body, than the full committee of fifteen men. The new Explorer Scout organization "borrowed" some of our original committee, and it was felt that this new group should have representation on the controlling body. With our Cub Pack supplying us Scouts, it was thought that perhaps some of this organization might eventually be in line to serve on the CAMP WILSON staff. With all of these things in mind, the Scout Troop Committee adopted a Constitution and By-Laws during July, 1945, which establishes Ownership, Management, Basic Rules and "CAMP WILSON TRUSTEES", with the method of choosing these Trustees prescribed.

"CAMP WILSON TRUSTEES", the controlling body of Camp Wilson, has jurisdiction over the maintenance, improvement and operation of Camp Wilson in its entirety.

There are five trustees with four chosen by the Scout Troop Committee, for a definite term of office, two serving two years each, and two serving one year each. At the conclusion of the one-year terms, these offices are filled by reappointment, or with new Trustees, and the term of office is then for two years. This will mean that there will always be experienced men serving as Trustees. The fifth Trustee is the Chairman of the Scout Troop Committee, who is appointed by the Sponsoring Institution, the Zionsville Christian Church. The five Trustees select their own Chairman. At any time, the four Trustees elected by the S.T.C. may be removed from office by a three-fourths vote of the membership of the S.T.C. The fifth Trustee, selected by the Sponsor, can be removed by the Sponsor, only.

The basic requirement of a Trustee is that he be registered with Boy Scouts of America, as a Scouter. This permits the choice of men from any of our Boy Scout Organizations—Cubs, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts.

Scout Troop Committee elects the Camp Wilson Treasurer, who must be a member of the Scout Troop Committee. The Treasurer does not have a vote in Camp Wilson Trustee action.

The Secretary-Registrar is selected by the Trustees, and the duties of this office include the recording of all permits for the use of Camp Wilson, and the issuing of all keys to those who have permits to use any part of the Camp. The Secretary-Registrar does not have a vote in Trustees' action, and has no authority to grant permission to use the Camp or any part of it.

One Basic-Rule states that the Trustees shall deny the use of Camp Wilson to any individual or group which repeatedly violates the "Camp Rules", or for immoral conduct. When any individual or group has been denied the use of Camp Wilson for these reasons, only the S.T.C. and/or Sponsor can again place them on the "eligible" list.

Any duly sponsored, properly chaperoned youth organization wishing to use CAMP WILSON for an Overnight Hike or Camporee, or the Lodge for a Special Party, write for an "Application Blank". Address your request to "CAMP WILSON, ZIONSVILLE, INDIANA". When you have completed your application, mail it to us, and the Trustees will act upon it, as promptly and impartially as possible. We will try to accomodate as many Youth Organizations as possible. Although CAMP WILSON is primarily a Zionsville Scout Camp, it may also be used by other youth organizations who qualify.

There will be no charge for Camping Permits, but there will be a small charge for the use of the Lodge to cover electricity and insurance.

ANY PERSON OR GROUP USING ANY PART OF CAMP WILSON WITHOUT PROPER PERMISSION, MAY BE PROSECUTED FOR TRESPASS.

We have a fine camp; we are proud of it; we want to operate it properly; we want our youth to benefit by it. Only by the constant observance of our rules and regulations by each one of us, may we gain our goal.

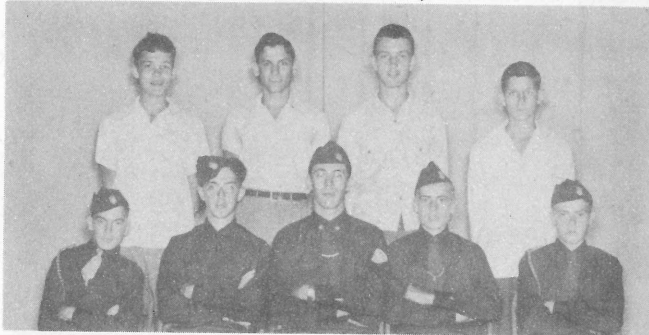

Explorer Scouts Post No. 358

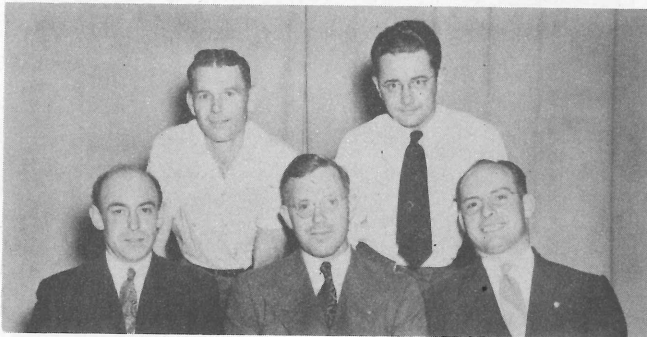

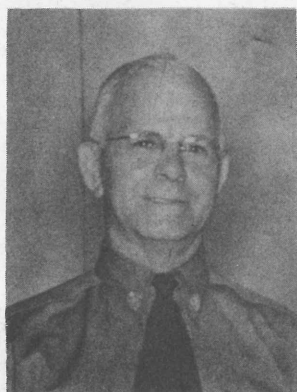

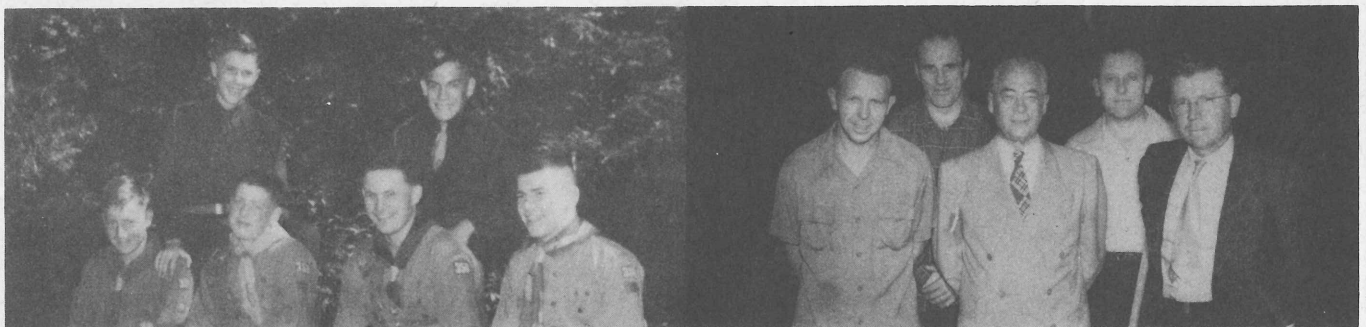

Merit Badge Counselors *Troop No. 358*

There is one group of men doing very important work in the field of Scouting, which is seldom mentioned outside the Scout Troop itself. The Merit Badge Counselor is a necessary Adult member of the Boy Scout Program.

Advancement is the basis of the Boy Scout program. A boy starts off on his Scouting career as a Tenderfoot and advances toward the rank of Eagle Scout—the highest rank in Scouting. Merit Badges are a part of this advancement, since a boy must qualify in certain Merit Badge subjects in order to reach Eagle Rank.

Through this advancement process the Scout learns many things: self-reliance; desirable habits; how to apply his Scout Oath and Law; how to be of service to others; and, of course, certain skills that will aid him in playing the game of Scouting.

The Counselor sees that the Merit Badge subject, like every other Scout activity, is a means to an end—a means of producing not a boy who is letter perfect in the subject, but a boy who, by studying the subject with his Merit Badge Counselor, has received training which goes into his character.

There are 110 Merit Badge Subjects, and Troop No. 358 has a Counselor for a majority of these subjects, and we are pleased to list them as follows:

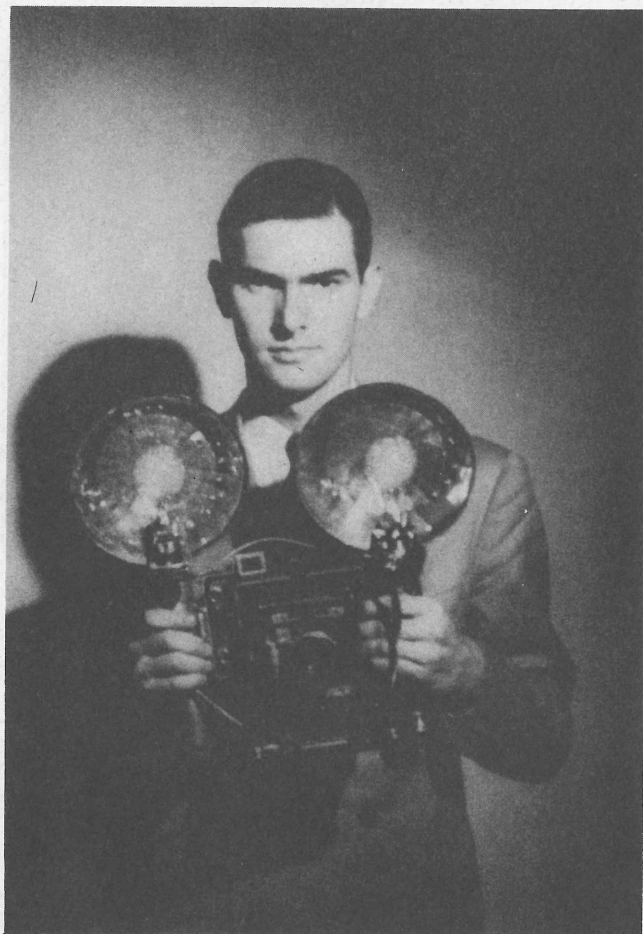

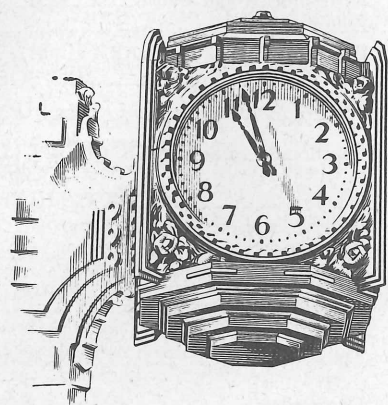

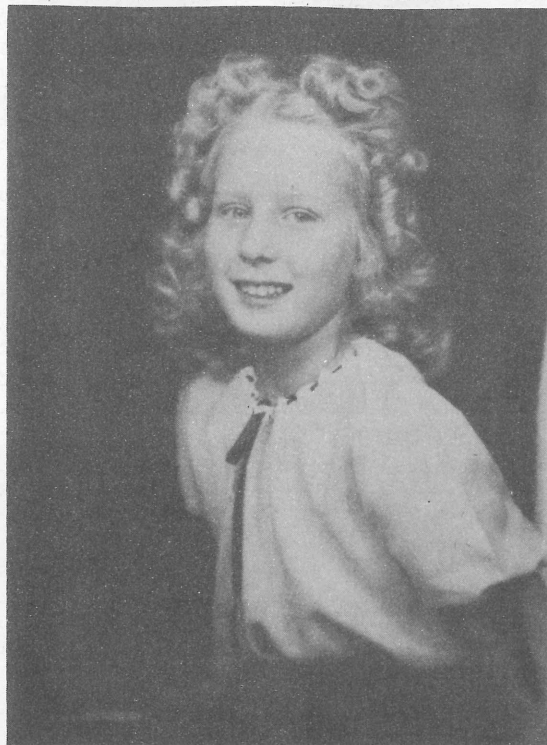

Special Services

The building of CAMP WILSON has been quite a task for a small committee, and a small community of less than 2,000. The Financial and Labor Donors have been numerous, as well as liberal and without them there would be no CAMP WILSON.

There is another group of Donors which has made a great contribution. To say that without this help we would have no Camp, might be a slight exaggeration, but we do say that this help has been extremely valuable.

We would like to pay tribute to this group by listing the names of the firms and individuals who were responsible for these contributions, and some of the ways in which this very valuable service was rendered.

ROCK ISLAND REFINING CO. Furnished tractor and equipment for grading building site. Furnished large steel tube supports for Eagle Bridge. Donated beautiful flag pole (see cover) and winch truck for setting this, and placing logs for smaller foot-bridge.

ZIONSVILLE HARDWARE (Frank Marquett). Frank has donated to this project, to date, hardware and tools in excess of \$150.

METZGER LUMBER CO. In addition to "selecting" much of the building materials, a great deal of the lumber was cut to exact dimension. Discounts in excess of \$150 have been allowed. Furnished space and electricity for fabricating parts for Eagle Bridge.

E. W. CAMP PLYWOOD CO. By arrangements with Metzger Lumber Co., materials were furnished "direct" at prices 10% below OPA wholesale prices. Savings in excess of \$150 resulted.

RALPH SHELburne. Furnished welding and metal work valued at more than \$60, for which a charge of \$25 was made; which in turn was donated to the building fund. Made iron band for top of outdoor furnace and installed it.

GARTHER HARKINS. Furnished shingles at Wholesale price, resulting in a saving of at least \$45.

I. F. LAUCKS CO. Furnished outside paint and all wood sealer used at a discount of 50%.

RUSSELL & SON (Hearn & Earl Russell). Donated and installed the gutters and downspouts on the Lodge. Furnished materials for well at discount.

PAUL CARTER. Furnished "free transportation" on materials from Indianapolis, effecting a saving in excess of \$50.

ZIONSVILLE THEATRE (Eva Harris). Whether they were asking for help, or announcing special shows, slides have been run as often as we wanted them, at no charge. Permitted use of popcorn machine, in connection with our Benefit Show and Dance.

ROY ECK. Largely through the efforts of Roy, the Public Service Company extended their lines to CAMP WILSON, permitting complete electric service. He also helped wire the Lodge and plan our electric system.

PIONEER EXCHANGE (Mr. Wisehan). Furnished light fixtures at cost, and has offered to supply all light bulbs to CAMP WILSON, for a period of five years, free.

ZIONSVILLE TIMES (Bernard Clayton). All articles and notices turned in by us, have been published, and in "good spots." The various printing jobs done for us, have been at much reduced rates.

MRS. DAVID SMOCK AND EARL SMOCK. Our whole organization is deeply indebted to Mrs. Smock and son Earl, for making it possible to deliver building materials and equipment directly to our building site. We were given permission to use a roadway through their farm, during the construction of Camp Wilson. This has undoubtedly caused them considerable worry and concern, and we really appreciate the special service to our project. We hope all of our Scouts and friends will always respect the Smock property, and will at all times do everything possible to maintain the present good feeling between ourselves and our good neighbor south of Camp Wilson.

EARL WAGNER and WILLIAM POST. These are the Rock Island employees that did such a fine job of welding on the bridge standards and the flag pole.

What about the future—the *Camp Wilson of Tomorrow*? Let's "Day Dream" a bit with the Chairman of the Trustees and the Scout Troop Committee.

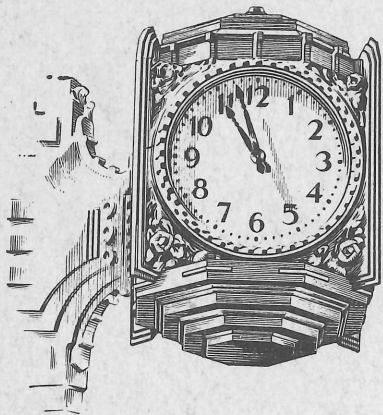
