Degree Programs

There are easy to understand options to gain a degree at the University. Each hour of coursework earns one credit toward your desired degree during the current year. Select any College to earn a degree. The degree option standards are as follows:

Bachelor's Degree

- 1. Complete the required training(s) for your registered position.
- 2. Complete six (6) University credits to include:
 - Four (4) credits from the College of your choice.
 - Two (2) additional elective credits from the General Studies or any other College.

Master's Degree

- 1. Complete the required training(s) for your registered position.
- 2. Hold a Bachelor's Degree from this University.
- 3. Complete six (6) additional University credits:
 - Three (3) credits from the College of your choice.
 - Three (3) additional elective credits from the General Studies or any other College.

Doctorate of Scouting Degree

- 1. Hold a Master's Degree from this University.
- 2. Complete six (6) additional University credits:
 - Four (4) credits from the required Ph.D. courses.
 - Two (2) credits from any other College of your choice.
- 3. Complete a written thesis/project under the mentoring and approval of the teaching staff.

Continuing Education Degree

- 1. Hold a Doctorate, Master's or Bachelor's Degree and desire to continue the educational process.
- 2. Complete six (6) additional University credits from any College. There is no limit to the number of Continuing Education Degrees you can earn from this University.

Sustainability Leadership Degrees

Sustainability means the ability to endure. Conserving the land, forests, air, water, wildlife, and limited resources we all share is everyone's responsibility. Reducing what we consume and recycling, repurposing, restoring, and repairing what we own all are parts of being thrifty, a key point of the Scout Law. Our journey began more than 100 years ago with an emphasis on conservation. In time, we deepened our commitment to environmental stewardship. Now, our focus has shifted to sustainability. We invite you to join us as our journey continues.

Complete all 6 introductory courses (SUS100 – SUS105) to receive your Bachelor's Degree in Sustainability Leadership and be qualified for joining our Council's Sustainability Committee.

Those who completed the Bachelor's degree in Sustainability Leadership, may take the Master's degree program. This year, SUS106, SUS107 and SUS108 are required for this Master's degree.

College of Program

The College of Program offers a Bachelor's and a Master's of Program Degree. Each hour of coursework earns one credit toward a degree.

Courses for Scouts BSA & Venturing

PB104 **Troop Committee Challenge:** Training for the troop committee. Committee learns who has responsibility for various tasks and how to work together within the group. (2 credits, Periods 5-6)

PB105 Conducting an Introduction to Leadership Skills for Troops (ILST): Want to get more out of your youth leaders? Get them trained through ILST. Learn what it is and how to make it a success.

(1 credit, Period 6)

PB107 **Scoutmaster Specific Training:** This course provides basic information and tools to work successfully as a Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster. Training is complete when Outdoor Leader Skills and Hazardous Weather have also been completed.

(5 credits, Periods 1-5)

PB109 Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills & BALOO: This course combines the required outdoor training for Scoutmasters, as well as the required outdoor training for pack leaders to have an overnight pack outing. There will be an introduction to outdoor skills such as: fire building, hiking, compass, knots, lashing, plant identification, etc. It is recommended supplemental training for all adults who camp with youth (Webelos and Venturing leaders). This course will meet at Camp Belzer and will include an overnight and prerequisites.

(6 credits, Periods 1-6)

PB132 **Mock Tenderfoot Board of Review:** Observe a mock Board of Review to learn appropriate demeaner, questions, process, etc. that can be used in your unit.

(1 credit, Period 3)

PB133 Merit Badge Counselor Training: In addition to the conventional training we will provide tools for more effective and interesting in-unit training of Scouts. We will provide access for files of schedules, teaching instructions, posters and interactive PowerPoint presentations that you can download FREE. This session will teach you how to use and adapt these tools for your unit.

(1 credit, Period 4)

PB134 **Troop Courts of Honor:** Learn how to produce impressive, inspirational Courts of Honor for your troop so that Scouts are proud to advance and honored to have their families attend!

(1 credit, Period 4)

PB135 **First Class Emphasis:** Advancement is an important tool for Scout achievement and retention. Learn how to program, track, and report so that your new Scouts BSA can achieve the goal of First Class rank within 12 to 18 months of joining, and Star rank soon thereafter.

(1 credit, Period 6)

PB136	Troop Awards & Recognition: One comprehensive course covering special awards (outside of rank advancement) for troops and adult Scouts BSA leaders (outside of training knots). Learn how to help your troop get the most out of the program, and to get special recognition for those who deserve it. (1 credit, Period 1)
PB161	Scoutmaster Conferences: What should it include? When should it occur? What should it accomplish? Get these answers and more. (1 credit, Period 2)
PB180	Let's Go Canoeing: Got the canoeing bug? Want to make it the safest outing possible? This course is designed to provide basic information on crew training, crew selection, and trip planning to help your units succeed. This course will also focus on both Northern Tier high adventure and local outings, and gives tips on great places to canoe in the Crossroads of America Council area. (1 credit, Period 6)
PB221	Introduction to OKPIK: This course will review the issues discussed in OKPIK (pronounced OOK-pick) is an experience in cold-weather camping and winter sports. Learn more and see discuss to prepare your Scouts and Venturers to participate. (1 credit, Period 1)
PB222	Order of the Arrow and Its Role in the Troop & Crew: Learn more about how this great Scouting service organization can be used to help strengthen your troop & crew. (1 credit, Period 4)
PB223	Firecrafter and Its Role in the Troop & Crew: Firecrafter is a service organization that is designed to emphasize the ideals of friendship, leadership and service, and is completed through self-advancement during a long-term camping experience. Learn how it can be used to strengthen your troop & crew. (1 credit, Period 1)
PB224	Advanced Knots: Really learn the ropes and what to do with them. If you enjoy knot tying you will love this course. <i>Limit of 15.</i> (1 credit, Period 1)
PB225	Splices: Ever wonder how to make a splice in a rope, or even why you would want to? This course is for you. Step-by-step instruction and personal attention will be provided so that you can splice with the best of them. <i>Limit of 15</i> . (2 credits, Periods 5-6)
PB226	Lashings: All pioneering structures are built by joining wood spars with rope. Troop leaders will learn or expand knowledge of this key element of pioneering. Brush up on your clove and timber hitches before the course! <i>Limit of 15.</i> (2 credits, Periods 2-3)
PB227	High Adventure Bases & Regional Camps: Overview of BSA High Adventure bases and regional camps, planning for a high adventure trip, understanding and reducing the risks of a high adventure experience plus some additional high adventure possibilities for older Scouts and Venturers. (2 credits, Periods 2-3)
PB230	Planning a Sea Base Trek: Find out what to do to choose and plan the trek and get your crew ready for their Sea Base adventure. (1 credit, Period 5)

PB231	Eagle Coach: Learn how this unit, district or council person benefits the Eagle candidate by evaluating the project plan and assisting the candidate through the Life to Eagle process. (1 credit, Period 3)
PB232	Eagle Scout Courts of Honor: Learn to use your troop's Eagle Courts of Honor to inspire and impress the younger Scouts and their parents! Give your Eagle Scouts the prestige they deserve! Learn about the components of impressive and effective Eagle Scout Courts of Honor, and all the resources out there to make each one unique. (1 credit, Period 1)
PB233	An Eagle Board of Review: Watch an actual Eagle Board of Review to learn the how to conduct them and participate in them in your district. (1 credit, Period 5)
PB244	Introduction to Team Building: Participate and learn to facilitate activities and initiative games to help with team building in your unit. (2 credits, Periods 5-6)
PB245	Ultralight Backpacking: Need to know information for the backpacker who wants to cut pack weight but keep the comfort. Gear, tips, tricks and stories of the experienced backpacker and what to buy or not buy for the novice backpacker. (1 credit, Period 3)
PB246	Philmont Trek Preparation: Valuable information when planning your first Philmont trek—forming a trek group, arranging shakedowns, training for youth and adults, transportation to Philmont, possible side trips, a personal preparation tracking card, trek selections, a participant contract, and more. (1 credit, Period 4)
PB255	Making Your Own Outdoor Equipment: Don't want to pay high commercial prices for essential backcountry camping and trek gear? Learn about making your own gear for less money. Featuring materials and hardware sources, sewing techniques, and design advice for making rain flies, portage packs, tents, stuff bags, and miscellaneous other equipment. Also, suggestions for repurposing/recycling items destined for the landfill. (1 credit, Period 3)
PB256	Youth-on-Youth Incident Training: BSA's ScoutingU has created some additional Youth Protection Training for professionals, volunteers, and leaders regarding the prevention of youth-on-youth incidents that might occur within the context of Scouting, especially in a camping or overnight setting. PG122	Essentials of Backpacking & Hiking: Introduction to equipment and venues for beginning backpackers and hikers. The course will include tips on great locations for backpacking and hiking right here in Indiana. (1 credit, Period 6)
PG125	Crossroads of America Council Year-Round Camping: Learn of the exciting activities at our camps that have everyone on the edge of their seats. All leaders will want to learn about the facilities added to our camps to help provide new opportunities for enjoyable and challenging programming all year round. (1 credit, Period 6)

PG146 Logistics 101: Every Scout event requires some planning. Cub Scouts, Scouts BSA, Venturing all have built in requirements for safety. But how about those other items. Via presentation and group discussion, tips and tricks for successful events will be explored. (1 credit, Period 3) Stand & Deliver: As Scout leaders we stand and deliver brief speeches constantly. Opening and closing PG203 meetings, delivering announcements, and providing guidance to youth members are all examples of the speaking that Scouters do every day. In 50 minutes you will learn how to perform your public speaking roles more effectively. Audience participation is guaranteed. Limit of 8. (1 credit, Period 5) PG243 Emergency Preparedness BSA Award: It is a challenge to be prepared for emergencies in our world of man-made and natural phenomena. This course is an introduction to the Emergency Preparedness BSA program which is planned to inspire the desire and foster the skills to meet this challenge in our youth and adult members so that they can participate effectively in this crucial service to their families, communities and nation. (1 credit, Period 5) PG282 Birds of Prey: Learn about the big birds that will fascinate your Scouts. (1 credit, Period 2) Scoutbook: The next generation of Scout Advancement software can be used by Scouts, families, den PG288 leaders, patrol leaders, unit leaders, merit badge counselors, district or council personnel. Track your child in Cub Scouting as well as in Scouts BSA. Manage your den or patrol requirements. Approve merit badge requirements in the cloud. Parents are copied on emails sent to their Scout. Track advancement in your unit, be able to communicate with your families, create reports, follow your unit's Journey to Excellence progress in real time, utilize the RSVP element, see new merit badges or requirements as soon as they are released. Learn about this multi-functional software, usable on smartphones, iPads or PCs. (2 credits, Periods 1-2) PG289 Service - Helpful, Friendly, Kind, Cheerful: Teach your Scouts the importance of service, while also fulfilling a Journey to Excellence requirement, and how to report it. (1 credit, Period 3) PG293 Outdoor Ethics: This class is an overview of the key aspects of BSA's Outdoor Ethics program. It is designed to help youth and adults at all program levels understand the general principles behind Scouting's outdoor ethics program. Topics covered include Leave No Trace, Tread Lightly, The Land Ethic / Stewardship to support the Outdoor Code, Outdoor Ethics Awareness and Action Awards, Outdoor Ethics resources and opportunities for additional Outdoor Ethics training. (1 credit, Period 2) Home Firearm Safety: This is the basic course for anyone unfamiliar with guns or who needs to learn gun PG294

Home Firearm Safety: This is the basic course for anyone unfamiliar with guns or who needs to learn gun terminology and the safe handling and storage of firearms at home. This is a 1-hour course developed by the Council Shooting Sports Committee Training Team to provide basic firearm safety information. Students will receive pamphlets on safety and terminology, lessons on the rules of safe gun handling, identifying and unloading various firearms, ammunition, cleaning, and safe gun storage. This course will be presented by members of the Council Shooting Sports Training Team who are experienced NRA Training Counselors.

(1 credit, Period 4)

- PG295 Hammock Camping - Basic: Tired of waking up on the hard ground in your tent? Want to stay dry when it's raining? Perhaps you'd like to learn more about the most comfortable method for camping ever created—off the ground in a hammock between 2 trees! (1 credit, Period 5) Survival Bracelets: Learn how to tie a survival bracelet and how to use one. If time allows tie more than PG296 one. Learn to tie more than one color. (1 credit, Period 4) PG298 Shooting Sports 2019: Learn about the new shooting sports programs in the Council and the BSA. Many changes occurred in 2016 in every shooting sports program from Cub Scouting through the Venturing and Exploring. Besides just earning merit badges, Scouts may participate in national shooting sports competition programs. The training opportunities for adults will be discussed in detail. Whether your interest is archery, rifle, shotgun, pistol or muzzle loading there is a program and training available. We will be reviewing the NRA, USAA, NMLRA certifications that are required for these programs. Learn about these exciting changes and get a peek at the future of shooting sports. (1 credit, Period 3) PG300 NOVA & SuperNOVA: The NOVA Awards program is an exciting adventure. With an emphasis on Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM), Scout leaders can learn about the wonders of different STEM fields and the NOVA or SuperNOVA (each named for a noted scientist) awards. Cool experiments, awesome field trips and fun activities are just part of the full STEM experience. (1 credit, Period 3) PG301 Astronomy 101: Learn about naked eye astronomy and how to "navigate" using the Big Dipper and bright stars. We'll also do a little "moon walking." Come to the Carmel High School Planetarium to see the show! (1 credit, Period 2 or 3) PG303 Are You Really Prepared for Your Unit Camping Trip: Identify the gaps in your current outing planning process, identify approaches to close the gaps and prepare an enhanced Deployment Plan for your next outing. (1 credit, Period 4) Leave No Trace - Awareness: This class is designed to help youth and adults at all program levels to PG305 understand the seven principles of Leave No Trace and how to apply them in the BSA outdoor program. It is also designed to give adults the confidence to assess youth understanding and skills
- when signing off on Scout rank or Venturing award requirements. Leave No Trace resources and training opportunities will also be discussed.

 (1 credit, Period 3)

 Wilderness First Aid Re-Certification: A current (or very recently expired) WFA certification card is required for this refresher course and must be presented at the beginning of this class session. Adult CPR/AED is a prerequisite. A valid Adult CPR/AED certificate must be presented at the beginning of this

class session. You must attend the full day presentation for certification.

SUS105	Motivating Change: How can we help our future selves? We'll review resources and recommendations for successful local implementation. Then you'll complete the final requirement for earning a degree. Write yourself an email about what you will be doing to make the life of your future self better at www.futureme.org. (1 credit, Period 6)
SUS106	Taking Sustainability to the Next Level: This class brings all of your previous learning together and helps you consolidate activities into an actionable, measurable, sustainability and communications plan. (1 credit, Period 1)
SUS107	Finances of Sustainability: Upon completion of this module you will have an understanding of the cost, saving and earning possibilities associated with sustainability. You will also develop a plan to ensure the funding stability of your troop, council, property or business funding. (1 credit, Period 4)
SUS108	Making Your Plan a Reality: By the end of this module you will have a plan for your development as a Sustainability leader. You will have clear goals, communications tools, identified partners, and key metrics for your Sustainability program. (1 credit, Period 5)
SUS109	Developing Sustainable Leaders: This module focuses on our most important opportunity to develop the next generation of leaders with a deep knowledge in Sustainability and a personal commitment to conservation and environmental leadership. (1 credit, Period 6)

Doctorate of Scouting

A Doctoral Candidate can be any Scouting adult who has achieved Bachelor's and Master's Degree status. Candidates who complete the Doctoral requirements will be expected to have achieved a level of proficiency in an area of study such that they will be recognized as a leading council resource person in that particular discipline. The candidate's work and documentation will be made available to all leaders on the council website. To this end, those receiving a Doctorate degree could be called upon by units, districts, or the council for the purpose of guidance or training of others in their specific field of study.

A candidate for the Doctorate degree will be assigned a counselor to provide guidance and direction in the completion of his/her thesis/project. Completion of the thesis/project is normally expected to be in six to nine months.

A Doctoral Candidate certificate will be awarded upon completion of the Doctoral course work. The Doctorate of Scouting degree will be awarded at the next University of Scouting following completion and approval of the thesis/project.

Thesis/Project

The thesis or project will be in the form of a written report, with appropriate photographs (if necessary), reference materials, etc. The subject matter will be of the candidate's choosing with guidance and direction from the candidate's counselor. The counselor will be selected with the mutual approval of the candidate and the proposed counselor. The thesis will be prepared and a copy will be submitted for approval to the Dean of Doctoral Studies.

Doctorate of Scouting Requirements*

- 1. Hold a Master's Degree from the University of Scouting.
- 2. Complete six (6) credits of Doctoral course work to include:
 - Ph.D. 300 two (2) credits, REQUIRED
 - Ph.D. 301 one (1) credit, REQUIRED
 - Ph.D. 302 one (1) credit, REQUIRED
 - Two (2) additional elective credits from any courses within the University curriculum.
 (It is recommended to use this opportunity of taking courses to enhance your knowledge in subject matter for your thesis or project)
 - University of Scouting faculty may receive one credit toward their degree requirement if they are teaching a course during the time available for their elective credits. Candidate must be available for all Ph.D. coursework.
- 3. Completion and approval of a thesis/project.

*The purpose of the University of Scouting and the Doctoral Programs of Scouting is to foster a successful learning situation.

The Dean of the Doctoral Program can make exceptions to the above requirements when it is reasonable and for the enrichment of the candidate.

Candidates pursuing a Doctorate degree should consider several potential thesis/project subjects prior to attending the University. Selection and approval of the subject will occur during the classroom sessions. Ideas for potential projects can be obtained by consulting individuals who have completed the degree in prior years. A library of past projects is maintained on the Crossroads of America Council website.

Doctoral Courses

Ph.D. **Thesis/Project Development:** This two-period course is designed to help candidates understand the thesis or project concept, and discusses the parameters for the resulting Doctoral document. Sample dissertations are available and candidates peruse papers pertaining to various subjects and make appropriate comparisons.

(2 credits, Periods 1-2)

Ph.D. **Thesis Workshop:** This course enables the candidate to select their specific thesis/project topic. There is open discussion concerning definition and limits to the topic as well as guidance toward the development of subject matter. Support and encouragement are substantial features of this course.

(1 credit, Period 4)

Ph.D. The Doctors Are In: This course will give Ph.D. candidates insight into various aspects of thesis and/or project development from the viewpoint of our current 2019 Doctors of Scouting.

(1 credit, Period 5)
